REGION TEN CAMPING COMMITTEE MEETING

Charles L. Sommers Wilderness Canoe Base

July 20, 1963

Robert D. Banks - Chairman, presiding

I. ATTENDANCE:

Robert D. Banks; Mace Harris; Robert B. Lamont; Lyman T. Powell; J. Kimball Whitney; Henry W. Schreiber, Regional Executive; Clifford J. Hanson, Base Director. Guests were Ron Walls, Assistant Base Director; Clyde "Sandy" Bridges, Base Maintenance Director and Michael Miler, Base Office Manager.

II. BASE DIRECTOR'S REPORT - Clifford J. Hanson

- A. Attendance to date is 122 crews with 1,207 Explorers and 185 Advisors. Staff of 86 full time men. Crews are slightly smaller in boy numbers but up small fraction with Advisors. Crews need extra adult to drive second car for transportation. Cancellations this year are below average, only 6.3%. 1961 was other lowest year with 4.5% cancellations.
- B. Staff is again top quality, interested and dedicated group. They continue to work for improvements on the trails and in the Base. We held the best staff training of any year to date.
- C. Base improvements are many - mainly gravel on the roads in the Base; the Lodge was scraped and varnished inside and out; new shelves in Trading Post store-room; commissary equipment issuing has been changed to issuing paddles from one room only and trail gear from the other room. All money, deposits and paddles sales are handled by one person for the commissary. Excavation of rock under dining hall has begun.
- D. A fire fighting demonstration was given by the staff for the committees viewing.

III. MARQUARDT WORKSHOP - Clyde "Sandy" Bridges

Henry W. Schreiber told of the generous offer of Miss Kathryn Marquardt, his secretary, to present several power tools and other wood working tools of her father's, in his memory, to the Canoe Base. She also offered to finance a building for the workshop.

Drawings of the proposed Marquardt Workshop under the "north" wing of the dining hall were shown by "Sandy." Included were interior plans and exterior walls. He also presented the itemized cost of the plan. The cost will be \$285.00 for two steel beams if we put them in. (\$100.00 saved off contractor price). Total cost to be under \$1,400.00 including cement floor, walls, electric wiring and beams. Staff will do the work. Lyman T. Powell moved work to be done and the money for enclosing the workshop be secured by the Canoe Base as Miss Marquardt is donating the tools, etc. Seconded by Robert B. Lamont. Carried unanimously. The committee voted to accept Miss Marquardt's offer of the tools and expressed their deep appreciation of her offer.

IV. MAPPING OF THE BASE - Ron Walls

Through very diligent work on "Sandy" Bridges and Ron Walls part, the Canoe Base boundary area has been approximately located. They had found brass survey markers that not even the Forest Service knew existed. The exact line can not be determined until a professional surveyor has "enclosed" the brass markers and verified it with the old original surveyors notes. Maps drawn by "Sandy" Bridges were shown and approximate boundary lines indicated. Robert D. Banks had walked the "marker lines" as found by "Sandy" Bridges and Ron Walls. It was voted to hire a professional surveyor to complete the exact line.

Robert D. Banks stated that exact lines will be needed before "property trade" for the present "Scout 40" (to the east of the Base) for Base acreage can be discussed with the U. S. Forest Service. He will contact Mr. L. Neff, Superior National Forest Supervisor in Duluth.

Mace Harris offered the help of his company and men in locating any additional land for trade if we have to acquire additional property before this "trade" can be accomplished.

V. SANITATION PROGRAM - Robert D. Banks

In the absence of Edward B. Chapin, Chairman of this project, Mr. Robert D. Banks reported on the progress to date. The two small aerator units are ready to be shipped from St. Paul. Through the courtesy of John M. Budd and the Great Northern Railway Company the tanks have been constructed. John Potter has delivered the "working mechanism" and it has been installed in the two 750 gallon tanks.

The State Health Department has stated that the third tank is too small and not adequate for the dining hall and new sauna. This plant will be sold and we will follow the Health Departments recommendations on the new size.

The cost for the two units, complete, is \$2,120.00. The interior working mechanism only for the large tank was \$2,606.00. We will pay upon delivery at the Base. Free transportation to Ely has been arranged by John M. Budd. (Base staff hauled the two tanks from Ely at a later date). Total cost of installations, complete, is still set at about \$10,000.00.

VI. CARETAKER AT BASE - Robert D. Banks

Because of the black topping of the new Fernberg Road and a new wider and better road being built to the Moose Lake Landing, it was pointed out that, we will need to consider that we must build a home for a full time caretaker at the Base. More information will be presented at the December meeting. Ron Walls stayed at the Base this past winter and is planning on staying again this coming winter.

VII. RICHARD L. NEWCOMB

The Assistant Director of Field Operations, Richard L. Newcomb visited the Base for the first time. He was very complimentary of the Base and its operation. He has had considerable experience in canoeing and canoe base operations. He was very well accepted by the staff and we appreciated his visit and suggestions.

VIII. 1965 FEES - J. Kimball Whitney

Fee study of Philmont, Region Seven Canoe Base and our Base should be made during this winter after the financial year ends to see if a change should be made. If a change is to be made, it should be announced during the previous year before going into effect.

IX. BASE NEEDS:- Clifford J. Hanson

We should secure the auxiliary electrical generator as discussed at previous meetings. Other needs include commerical washing machine, fire fighting hose, possibly another fire fighting pump, mixer for kitchen, and additional latrine facilities for staff.

CHARLES L. SOMMERS WILDERNESS CANOE BASE1963 SUMMARY

Again this year the attendance at the Charles L. Sommers Wilderness Canoe Base set another all time high in attendance.

I. ATTENDANCE:

We had 81 crews with 842 Explorers and 106 Advisors from Region Ten.

There were 185 crews with 1819 Explorers and 312 Advisors from outside of Region Ten.

Guests, staff, Explorers and Advisors totaled 3,223 in 266 crews from 94 councils from 38 states. All twelve regions were represented at the Base for the first time in history.

The steady number of crews on each starting date made for very smooth trail and Base operation. The Base operation itself was one of the smoothest in recent times. The "no shows" were very low again also. These all contributed to the high efficiency of staff time and ability. Two Region Ten Councils did not participate.

II. STAFF:

The continued high quality and spirit of the staff made it one of the seasons highlights of the Base operations. Seventy-nine men served as guides and base staff, and twenty-three were swamper. The capable "ol' timers" accounts for excellent operation by staff.

As in the past years, base maintenance and construction by the staff accounted for a great saving in finances as well as excellent up keep of the Base.

III. BUILDINGS & IMPROVEMENTS:

1. The Marquardt Workshop was built under the "north wing" of the dining hall in memory of William A. Marquardt, Kathryn Marquardt's father. (Miss Marquardt is Henry W. Schreiber's secretary). The power tools were presented to the Base by Miss Marquardt. The staff did all of the work except a small amount of jack hammering of the stone.
2. The area around the Base was surveyed by Clyde "Sandy" Bridges and Ron Walls. Later a professional surveyor Mr. Floyd of Ely "tied in" the brass markers and the notes of the original survey. This is now on file.
3. Sanitation plans were made and surveyed for the placement of three aerators at the Base. Approval was given by the State Health Department for installation of two 750 gallon aerators. The tanks were built to specification and shipped to Ely through the courtesy of John M. Budd and the Great Northern Railway. These two tanks were not installed by the end of the season but are at the Base.
4. Six loads of gravel were put on the roads in the Base.
5. The Lodge was scraped outside and the "Log Cabin was varnished" both inside and out.
6. Twenty new aluminum canoes were added to our fleet. Total canoes now 245.

7. Five new Seliga fiberglass and wood canoes were purchased for the guides. These are the first "guide canoes" purchased since 1955. (A real morale booster to the guides).
8. A new aluminum square stern canoe was purchased.
9. Three new platforms and tents were built in the new Explorer Tent City Area east of the new sauna.
10. A change was made in the commissary. All trail equipment is now issued from the old equipment room. Our paddles are issued from the new equipment room. Only one man handles all money for commissary; crew deposits, paddle sales, and equipment damages, using a receipt for all money received.
11. Three new receipt machines were purchased with Canoe Base headings printed and special receipt categories on the forms. One machine each for the office, Trading Post and Commissary.
12. New storage shelves were built in the Trading Post for all reserve supplies.
13. A Canoe Base design metal neckerchief slide was added to the Trading Post. Extremely well accepted.
14. A 1947 Ford, 1½ ton dump truck was purchased for heavy and rough hauling. It is called "Big Red" by the staff.
15. Several large pots and pans, also a large electric slicer was purchased for the kitchen.
16. One-hundred surplus cot mattresses were secured from Ft. Ripley.
17. A large rug was given to the Base for the Guide Lounge by Frank Kovach the Postmaster at Ely.
18. Fifty new Voyaguer tents were added to the trail equipment.
19. The best organized training program for Guides and Base staff was held at the beginning of the season. This will be continued and improved each year.
20. Several hundred seedlings of pine, balsam and spruce were planted in the spring by Ron Walls. They were furnished by Mace Harris and the Superior National Forest.
21. The 3,000 gallon redwood watertank was traded to the Viking Council for three desks for the office.

IV. PUBLIC RELATIONS:

1. Richard L. Newcomb, Assistant Director of Field Operations, visited the Canoe Base in July.
2. Three of the Canoe Base staff guides - Tom Ogle and Tom Grunwald of Kentucky, and Mike Smith of Minnesota left the Canoe Base on June 5 and paddled to Hudsons Bay via the Churchill River. (the toughest route). They covered the 1,500 miles in 55 days. Returned to the Base (by train and car) and guided in August. Excellent publicity for the Base - made Canadian and U. S. newspapers all over both countries.

3. Two Canoe Base staff men - John Purcell and Dick Coming left the Canoe Base on September 12, and are traveling down the Mississippi. Plan to go to the Bahama Islands if they can. Also they have had excellent publicity along the river.
4. Two guides entered the Atikokan, Canada to Ely and return Canoe Derby. They did not place this year due to swamping in extremely high winds.
5. We had a Canoe Base display at the National Order of the Arrow Conference at the University of Illinois put on by the Agaming Lodge of St. Paul, under Mike Miler's direction.
6. The same display was used at the following National Scout Executives Conference at Urbana, Illinois. Mike Miler, George Hedrick, Willis Elliott and former guide Reginald Knight of the Pheasant Council, handled the display.
7. Newspaper coverage and stories have been in many papers throughout the country including our own stories, special articles by Jim Hood, Assistant Commissary Director and the crews who attended the Base. Pictures in almost all publicity were taken by Roy Conradi and Dave Sitzer, our Base photographers.
8. We were host to 15 Explorers of the Ely Explorer Post for an afternoon and evening.
9. Special guests this summer were the daughters of Carlos Chase, founder of the Boy Scout Canoe Trails. They had never been to the Base before.

MEMORIAL TO

Fred Moyer, Guide at the Charles L. Sommers Wilderness Canoe Base who was struck by lightning while helping his crew to shelter in a severe storm on Basswood River, August 22, 1963.

Fred Moyer was a first year guide who showed the ability of a veteran on the trails. He was 23 years of age and came from McAllen, Texas.
