REGION TEN CAMPING COMMITTEE MEETING  
Charles L. Sommers Wilderness Canoe Base  
July 25, 1965

1. FOREST SERVICE VISIT:

On July 24, the Canoe Base was visited by Edward B. Cliff, Chief of the Forest Service from Washington, D. C.; George J. James, Regional Forester from Milwaukee; Lawrence P. Neff, Supervisor of Superior National Forest of Duluth; Jack Wolters, Lands and Recreation Use Director for the Superior National Forest; Lacy Johnson, Ranger for the Kawishiwi District in Ely; and John Vogle, Ranger for the Halfway District south of Ely.

They were shown around the Base, and the program was explained to them. They joined the crews that came "off the water" that evening for dinner and then had an informal discussion with the Regional Camping Committee.

It was the opinion of Mr. Edward Cliff that we would not be able to exchange other desired areas of forested land for the ownership of the acreage that the Canoe Base is located on. He offered a 30 year lease instead of the yearly one that we now operate. This was accepted by the Regional Camping Committee.

The Canoe Base and the U. S. Forest Service are to work out a plan for the acreage needed to operate a new boundary line and the lease will be written. Mr. Jack Wolters will come out with Mr. Lacy Johnson and the area will be arranged.

The Boundary Waters Program was discussed.

2. LAND ACQUISITION:

The committee discussed the plan as recommended by Mr. Edward B. Cliff and also recommended that we secure the help of the Boy Scout Engineering Service and consult with Russell A. Turner, National Director of Camping when he visits the Base arriving this Sunday night. A full plan for the Base layout is to be made and approved by the National B.S.A., Engineering Service, the Superior National Forest and the Region Ten Camping Committee. The plan is to include the acreage needed to operate efficiently and include land for the present sanitation system and lagoon as well as the proposed ranger home. It is to be put on paper with written approval and okayed by both the U. S. Forest Service and the Boy Scouts of America.

3. RANGER:

The need for a ranger to live and work at the Base was discussed. The proposed ranger home was tabled for the present due to cost of the sanitation system.

Clifford J. Hanson stated that he had discussed the job with Clyde "Sandy" Bridges who has served on the Canoe Base staff for about three years, and he is interested.

Duties, time, etc., were discussed and it was decided that Clifford J. Hanson should contact "Sandy" and come to a definite conclusion on salary and starting date. Salary offer was to be up to \$3,000.00 per year, starting as soon as "Sandy" is available. He will stay in the director's cabin in the winter, and other arrangements - tent, etc., for the summer season.

4. 1965 BUDGET:

Henry W. Schreiber reported that as of July 22, the budget was still based on 290 crews but will have to be adjusted because the crew attendance will fall below 290 crews. Some items have been committed on the previous 290 crew budget such as salaries and will be carried.

Some budget items were discussed including the necessity to be certain that the 1965 inventory be reduced to under \$2,500.00. 1964 inventory was \$9,653.43.

5. FEES:

The Canadian Lands and Forest informed the Canoe Base that all people 17 years of age and above must purchase adult Canadian fishing licenses. Up until now, those 20 and under could secure the Canadian fishing licenses on the \$2.00 per boy permit through the Base.

It was moved by J. Kimball Whitney that the boys 17 and over pay the difference of \$4.21 if they desire to fish. Carried.

The additional items that have been added to what the fees now cover were discussed. They are insurance of \$1.00 per person; \$2.00 per boy for Canadian fishing licenses, plus \$13.20 per crew on the new food tax into Canada.

The opinion was expressed but not voted on that we should pass the Canadian fishing licenses on to the boys. This subject will be discussed at the December Camping Committee Meeting.

6. SANITATION SYSTEM:

The committee inspected the whole system including the pipe lines, lift station, aeration plant, lagoon and dam.

Ron Walls, Assistant Base Director told of the work and problems that had been encountered. He told of the problems and work in the swamp, and the mud and rock that had slowed down the Standard Construction Company. He informed the committee of the tremendous amount of work that the Canoe Base staff had done on the project and repairing the equipment that broke down due to the mud and rock. He stated that all that was left to do at present time was hooking up the pipes to the dining hall, sauna, family utility building and the pipe into the lagoon. The system has been tested by lake water and is functioning okay. Water is being run into the lagoon to start filling it up to the depth needed. Mr. Jerry Miller, Engineer and Robert Tipple, Michael Sales came up and checked over the starting operation.

Edward B. Chapin reviewed the "Estimated Cost of Canoe Base Sewage Plant" and "Estimate of Income For Canoe Base Capital."

A discussion followed on funds and where available. Henry W. Schreiber is to present the needs to two foundations as soon as definite costs are known.

All funds to be raised must not interfere in anyway with available funds to local councils was definitely reemphasized by the committee.

The cost of setting the big aeration tank into place was \$385.00 instead of \$250.00 as was estimated.


Robert D. Banks and Edward B. Chapin highly commended the staff for their work. A special commendation was paid Ron Walls for his supervision of the whole job and his work and extreme effort "over and above the call of duty."

Plans were made to pay special thanks to Earl Ruble and Jerry Miller. The tentative date was set for August 14, if they can come to the Base. Henry W. Schreiber is to secure a Scout statuette wall plaque and inscribed with thanks. Clifford J. Hanson will have two paddles painted, plus suitable recognition for the staff help from the Base.

7. ATTENDANCE:

Clifford J. Hanson reported that todate we have had 145 crews with 1821 participants. This includes 70 guides, 25 base staff and 18 swampers. We still have 128 crews to come with about 1,550 more totaling about 3,300 to 3,400.

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THE CHARLES L. SOMMERS WILDERNESS CANOE BASE1965 SUMMARYI. ATTENDANCE:

<sup>1965</sup> 1965 marked another all time high in attendance with a total of <sup>347</sup> 3316 Explorers, Advisors and staff taking part.

We had <sup>63</sup> 84 crews with <sup>643</sup> 850 Explorers and <sup>81</sup> 121 Advisors from Region Ten. One council did not participate.

There were <sup>2187</sup> 184 crews from outside of Region Ten with a total of <sup>337</sup> 1856 Explorers and 314 Advisors.

A total of 96 councils from 12 regions and 37 states participated during the 1965 season.

II. STAFF:

The quality and fine spirit of the staff was again a highlight in the operation of the Base this year. The staff totaled <sup>111</sup> 105 and were from <sup>22</sup> 23 different states.

This summer saw the introduction of a new training program which proved very successful. In addition to staff conducted sessions and practical experience we brought speakers to the Base. Included were Joe Seliga who spoke on canoe repairs, Charles Strachen on fishing, a member of the U.S. Forest Service and a Canadian Park Ranger. George Hedrick spoke on Canoe Base history. The new Scramper training program has contributed a good supply of guides for the 1966 season.

The staff contributed \$150.00 to be used to install a ceiling in the staff lounge.

Again this summer staff members were on the move with exciting high adventure trips. 5 hearty members canoed to Great Slave Lake from the west - a trip many said could not be made. These voyagers included; Marc Wermager (Minnesota) Dave Wolfe (South Dakota) Bruce Tannehill (North Dakota), Rolly White (South Dakota) and Bob Henry (Tennessee). The total trip took 55 days. Three others also made the trip to Great Slave Lake coming in from the east. This group consisted of Jerry McKay (Minnesota) and Ted and Terry Ogle (Kentucky). Roger Zimmerman (Minnesota) and Mike McMahon (Minnesota) covered lakes 300 miles north of the Base on a trip at the end of the season. Also out in search of high adventure was Bill Lindgren (Minnesota) and Joel Picken (Minnesota) along with Steve Millard (Texas). Their trip took them down the Albany River. Harlan Hanson (Minnesota) and Ray Mattson (Minnesota) made the trip from the Canoe Base to St. Paul via water, from Lake Superior to the St. Croix and on to the Mississippi. The Base also sponsored a team in the annual Ely to Atikoken, Ontario canoe derby and it has been decided to discontinue this event.

III. IMPROVEMENTS:

The Dining Hall and Directors Cabin were varnished with "Log Cabin Syrup" this summer.

The parking lot was enlarged and improved with a substantial gravel base.

The staff tent area was enlarged and re-arranged for greater use and easier access.

Stone steps were added to the front of the Dining Hall improving the beauty of the building.

The Base area was landscaped with the liberal use of trees and grass following completion of the sanitation system.

All the tent areas were removed from the boundry area and located in a new spot. It is now a "Tent City".

The ramp to the Bay Post was repaired and strengthened.

IV. ADDITIONS:

A special concrete building was constructed on the site of the old water tank. It will be used for storage of crew valuables - appropriately called the "Moose Lake Bank".

Six new tents and platforms were added in tent city replacing an older area.

Twelve rustic, split cedar chairs were added to the staff building as a gift of Robert D. Banks.

Several new books were added to the Canoe Base collection through the efforts of George D. Hedrick.

The trading post operation was helped with the addition of an electric cash register, a gift of Paul Rhodes of the International Harvester Company.

The Base received a 16 mm Bell and Howell movie projector as a gift from William Yale, of Empire Photosound.

Six additional lockers were built in the lower Bay Post for storage of individual guides trail equipment.

Five new lockers and a re-arrangement of the door were added to the guides locker room.

New storage areas were cleared along the waterfront for canoes.

The electrical wiring was completed in the Marquardt Workshop.

A commercial mixer was purchased for the kitchen and proved most effective this summer.

The Canoe Base underwent an electric wiring change to accomodate the increased power demands.

The old sauna was remodeled with sinks and toilet facilities added.

The photographic department was aided with the addition of a new Rollie 2.8 camera as a gift of John Bean.

Fencing for the lagoon and additional fire hose was added as a gift of John Budd.

Equipment in the workshop was increased with the addition of an electric router as a gift of Miss Katy Marquardt.

The Family Utility building was enlarged with an addition to house a commercial dryer.

Additional storage space was made available by additional digging under the Dining Hall.

Over 500 feet of shock cord was given to the Canoe Base to hold life jackets in canoes, through the help of Major Kenneth McIlvain and several Air Force Bases around the region.

V. PUBLIC RELATIONS:

A Canoe Base display was sent to the National Order of the Arrow Conference held during August at Bloomington, Indiana.

Special stories and pictures were released to hometown papers on all staff members. Other news releases were made throughout the summer. National promotion was given through the Big Three release of the National Office.

Several distinguished persons visited the Canoe Base this summer. Senator Eugene McCarthy, Mr. Edward Cliff, Chief of the United States Forest Service, Washington, D.C. Mr. George James, Regional Forester, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Lawrence P. Neff, Supervisor, Superior National Forest.

VI. RANGER:


The investment in property and equipment was made more secure with the employment of Clyde "Sandy" Bridges as the full time Canoe Base Ranger. Sandy will live year round at the Base in constant supervision of the property and will assist in the program during the summer.

VII. SANITATION SYSTEM:

This project is listed separately because of the tremendous effort put forth by all concerned. The planning by the Regional Committee, the work and dedication of the staff all resulted in the completion of this vital service at the Base. It was put into operation and functioned effectively this past season.
